Full Steam Ahead for Outdoor Education The staff and governors at William Barnes are proud that the school's residential programme has stayed on course despite the challenges of the last two school years. At a time when many academies and schools have made the decision to cancel all residential stays and school trips, the staff at William Barnes decided that if at all possible, the children should not miss out on this life changing and character building experiences. Having excellent professional relationships with each of the centres, and a reputation for expecting the very highest standards of behaviour from their children during overnight stays, our staff were in close contact with the centre managers throughout the year. As soon as the opportunity arose and restrictions lifted, we were amongst the first schools



to get the call from PGL, Leeson and Carey and were able to secure dates for visits when other schools missed out. As a result, despite all of the barriers in the way, when it would have been easy just to cancel the visits for the time being, our children have enjoyed these once in a lifetime opportunities.

Our current year 6 and the children in year 7 at the High School have both enjoyed a visit to PGL at Weymouth, challenging themselves with various activities including abseiling and raft building under the guidance of Mr Field, Mrs Howarth and Mrs Snow. The last two year 5 classes have both had wonderful visits to Leeson House on the Isle of Purbeck, spending three days completing beach studies and historical visits, with Mr Hull, Mrs Howarth and Mrs Warwick-Price. Similarly, year 4 have just returned from their overnight stay at Carey camp in Wareham Forest, supervised by Miss Marks, Mrs Warwick-Price and Mrs Baker the children built shelters and improved their orienteering skills.

Forest School Arrives in September Since taking the reins at William Barnes head teacher Mrs Wrixon has always had the ambition to give the children the opportunity to extend their learning further in the outdoors. However, with the cost of hiring coaches and the loss of curriculum time travel to a suitable site would cause, it seemed that this dream would not become a reality. However, by chance an opportunity arose recently when Mrs Wrixon heard that Primary Forest School had a rare gap in their schedule, and would be able to bring the Forest school experiences to William Barnes every Tuesday afternoon.

The plan is for each class to have an afternoon of outdoor learning in the school grounds with the Forest school staff. There will also be a lunchtime Forest school club and children will also be given the opportunity to become Eco Warriors. It is planned that the area around the Willow Frog near the top gate will also be developed to create a specific Forest School area within the grounds. This initiative is literally 'hot off the press' and we will share more details in September as soon as we know more.

What are Forest Schools? Forest School is a child-centred inspirational learning process, that offers opportunities for holistic growth through regular sessions. It is a longterm program that supports play, exploration and supported risk taking. It develops confidence and self-esteem through learner inspired, hands-on experiences in a natural setting.

Forest School has a developmental ethos shared by thousands of trained practitioners around the world, who are constantly developing their learning styles and skills to support new and imaginative learners. Its roots reach back to the open-air culture, friluftsliv, or free air life, seen as a way of life in Scandinavia where Forest School began. It arrived in the UK in 1993 and has grown from strength to strength since then.



Learning Outdoors at the Magnificent Mill William Barnes Primary School were very lucky to be invited to participate in the Magnificent Mill Arts and Music Project. The project is run by a company called Emerald Ant and was designed pre-Covid to join together our school and Yewstock, but obviously, the schools have had to work separately. The company is run by Sarah Butterworth (artist) and Ellen Vasquez (music). They secured funding for art and music workshops and were able to work directly at the mill or outside at school with Years 2, 3, 4 and 5. (RF)



New Outside Area for Reception Exciting News! We are delighted to inform you that during the Autumn Term the Reception Outside Area is going to be transformed! The space is going to be extended by moving the fence and a large piece of climbing apparatus is going to be installed the 'Hartfell Climber', under the climbing frame will be some colourful shock proof safety surfacing.



In addition, to the climbing equip-

ment we are having a new thermoplastic roadway installed which will ensure the bikes, trikes and scooters can be used on a daily basis. Finally, we are going to have some new markings on the grounds which will be bright and colourful; but most importantly will be used for active learning sessions.

Outdoor Art with Sarah Butterworth Year 5 were given yet another opportunity to



benefit from learning in the outdoors when they enjoyed two days at Sturminster Mill working with artist Sarah Butterworth. Following a tour of the mill during which they were able to see the various mechanisms in action, the children began considering the importance of 'the miller' as a key figure in the community. In order to appreciate and celebrate the many millers who had been at the heart of Sturminster's community over many years, the children constructed 3d head and shoulders models of the millers. Using tape and willow, the children gradually built up a the shape of their miller's head before covering their structure with thick tissue soaked in glue. Once the models had dried, the children added features using paint, wool and other materials. The children enjoyed having two whole days working with a successful local artist and were pleased and proud with the finished models they created.

PGL on Reopening Day! Little did we know back in September when, we were given alternative dates for PGL, that the date would be so significant! The Year 6 PGL adventure to Weymouth went ahead only because we were booked on the very day that venues could re-open! Due to Covid, the emphasis was on outdoor activities even more than usual and there was strict guidelines around communal areas and different schools (we had a whole accommodation block to ourselves!)

There was poor weather forecast, but we saw little of it and Year 6 had a wonderful time. They key focuses have





always been on teamwork and pushing comfortable boundaries and it was wonderful to see both of these in abundance.

Accompanied by Mr.Field, Mrs Howarth and Mrs Snow (on her last residential), the children abseiled, zip-wired and archeried away. They also constructed and rode rafts at the Olympic Sailing Centre on Portland, learnt how to light fires and worked in large groups to solve large problems!

Recognising that many of the children had never been to London and seen the sites, he was determined to make the journey to the capital happen if at all possible. Coaches were booked, gallery visits organised and parents informed. However, as the situation in London began to shift in May, Mr Field looked carefully at his risk assessments and decided with a heavy heart, that now was not the time to take his class to London, stopping at busy service stations on the way. Despite this, year 6 had a brilliant day with Mr Field learning about the trip virtually and completing a variety of art activities linked to this now traditional annual visit.

Reception Class Trip to Gore Farm On Wednesday 23rd of June Reception Class visit-

ed Gore Farm. The children were all excited about traveling on the coach. Upon arrival, the children were shown where to wash their hands and put their lunchboxes. Next, the

children enjoyed a snack and then the truly exciting activities began! The children then had the opportunity to hold some chicks and birds, including 4 days old quails! The children then had an informative tour



around the farm, seeing chickens, turkeys, lambs, calves, pigs and machinery. After a busy and exciting morning, the children ate lunch outside. This was an unusual lunchtime, as the children sat outside, they could see and hear the animals as they ate their

In the afternoon, the children then went on a tractortrailer ride to the woods where they went on a treasure and minibeast hunt. After such a lovely busy day, it was time to head back to school. The coach ride back was a very quiet one! (SR) **Spudtastic!** Way back in early March all the children in Year One planted a potato, learning that it is a tuber. Twenty potatoes were planted in five special growing bags, which the children worked out meant four potatoes in each bag. They soon began to sprout and grow. Every so often we would check on



their progress and made sure they were kept watered. We marvelled at how quickly they grew until the magic day arrived last week when they were ready to harvest. Excitedly, all the children watched as the bags were tipped out on the playground. Everyone

got stuck in searching for potatoes and we had soon collected half a bucket full, but how many potatoes were there? Estimates varied from fif-

teen to a thousand! The next day the children worked in pairs to count their own bowl of potatoes, they then used their knowledge of tens and ones and Dienes cubes and rods to help them add twodigit numbers together until we arrived at the total - 158 potatoes. Well done to Ralph, whose estimate of 150 was the closest. The potatoes were then shared out and taken home to be cooked and enjoyed with some butter, mayonnaise or ketchup. (JH)

Cyber Attack Thwarted at William Barnes Staff at William Barnes were shocked to find that the school had been dragged into a global cyber threat at the end of term. A vulnerability had been detected by ethical hackers in all Microsoft operating systems that allowed 'bad actors' to take control of a network. If an unsuspecting user downloaded a small piece of malware from an e-mail, this could take over the printer spooler software, an integral part of every Windows computer's operating system. Each time a different computer printed a document, the

malware would replicate itself giving remote users complete control of the network. Fortunately, our IT support company TurnItOn picked up the issue. Although the actual threat was very small, they deactivated our printers remotely and the staff were unable to print for two days until a patch had been provided by Microsoft for Windows.

Young Archaeologists Enjoy Mesolithic Mayhem!! Year 5 have been learning about human life in pre-historic times during our topic on the Stone Age this term. Using the classic children's novel Stig of the Dump as a centrepiece, the children have learnt about experimental archaeologists and how they use artefacts to make educated guesses about life in the time before there were any written records of human life. As part of this study, the children learnt about cave painting across Europe and speculated on the reasons why people living in the Mesolithic creat-

The scheme is aimed at children in year 6 who will be given the opportunity to develop their cycling skills and their traffic awareness so that they can feel safe when riding their bikes on the busy roads around Sturminster Newton. Stay Safe Online Over the Summer At William Barnes, the children are taught how to stay safe on line from reception upwards. This year, as more and more events have been held virtually and children have spent more time than ever connecting with their friends using the internet, it is more important than ever that the <u>children put into practice what they know</u>. The key messages are that the



children should not give away any personal information and that they should never make a friend of someone they do not know in real life. If they feel uncomfortable they should tell a trusted adult. (Please see SMART poster overleaf.)

If you or your child feels uncomfortable about how someone is communicating online, or feels that they have been a target of online abuse, then it is really important to make a report on the CEOP web site. CEOP will investigate your report and by gathering information from many reports

from the public they are able to find patterns in online behaviour that can lead to prosecutions. They can offer also support and guidance for children and families who have experienced online abuse and give you tried and tested advice about the best way to deal with it.

International School Award

We are delighted to announce that last term, William Barnes Primary was awarded the Foundation Level of the British Council's prestigious International School Award in recognition of its work to bring the world into the classroom.

The International School Award celebrates the achievements of schools that do exceptional work in international education. Fostering an international dimension in the curriculum is at the heart of the British Council's work with schools, so that young people gain the cultural understanding and skills they need for life and work in today's world.

William Barnes international work includes embedding aspects of Global Learning and Citizenship in to our everyday classroom teaching and having a whole school focus on three of the United Nations Sustainable Development goals; SD3 Good Health and Wellbeing, SDG 12 Responsible Consumption and Production and SDG15 Life on Land which has led to a number of projects that are currently running or planned for in school.

In the last two years, some of the highlights of our Global Learning have been:

- Year 6 Malala Day
- Year 4 Weekly 'Plogging' Picking up litter around the school environment whilst also
 raising fitness levels, learning about the impact of litter on local, national and global
 environments and learning about how the problem is being tackle on the local, national
 and global scale.
- Connecting with an International School through the British Council's Connecting Classrooms scheme. This was initially with a school in Nepal but unfortunately coincided with global lockdowns last March and may need to be with a school in a different locality in the future.
- Reducing single use plastic waste in school; the TerraCycle scheme, getting rid of
 plastic straws for milk and reducing the amount of laminate used in school.

We were so excited to be able to communicate and launch our plans properly with our whole school community but like so many things, our efforts have been somewhat thwarted by the impact of Covid. We are sure that 2021-2022 will be an exciting year though, so please watch this space for further information about Global Learning at William Barnes!
