'We' Project for Next Year Over the last year, the children at William Barnes have been given the opportunity to influence the world beyond our school gates in a variety of ways. They have raised money for charities, received the Eco-School award and learnt about the importance of saving energy and developing biodiversity. Next year, the staff are going to work with the children to produce a list of 100 ways that William Barnes can change the world. This is part of a larger project to involve 100 schools all thinking of 100 ways each to change the world. This would result 10,000 combined actions from all of the primary schools involved that could be celebrated in an annual' We Day'. The idea is to help children to realise that

- Pupil's actions can make a difference, no matter how small
- Pupil's actions can extend beyond the school gates and can include the '100 actions' and a 'We Day'.
- A range of rich extra curricular experiences are offered to pupils such as trip to galleries and Theatre
- Families can get involved again extending the project beyond the school gates—for example when families have donated cuddly toys for Born Free Day or materials for the Forest School.

Next year, the children and staff ask that everyone has their thinking caps on to help us make the 'We' Project a huge success and teach the children that together we can change the world.

Well Done Mr Newman Many of you may not realise that Mr Newman is not only an inspiring and talented KS1 and KS2 teacher, he is also the mastermind who pulls the strings behind all of the sport in the local cluster of schools. Before the last change in government, school sport was organised by professionals called 'School Games Organisers' who worked 2 days a week to put together the annual program of events. Each cluster of schools has their own SGO. In 2010, the New gov-

ernment maintained the funding for school sports, but removed the network of SGOs across the country, expecting teachers like Mr Newman to take up the slack without any reward apart from the satisfaction of making a difference. As a result, when a rounders, aquathon, athletics, tag rugby, dodgeball, or football event takes place between Child-Okeford, Shillingstone, Stalbridge, Hazelbury Bryan and WilliamBarnes, you can be assured that Mr Newman will have been helping behind the scenes.

At William Barnes, Mr Newman is also the PE leader, responsible for ensuring that the school maintains its status as a 'Gold' mark school for sport. To achieve this, the school has to fulfil a host of criteria including offering chances for children to compete with other schools and chances for less active children to be encouraged by our sports ambassadors to participate in a lunchtime sports club. This year, Mr Newman has done a brilliant job in meeting a range of new expectations to achieve the Gold Mark for the 8th successive year.

Finally, all the staff and children would to thank Mr Newman for his amazing hard work keeping the school pool running. This involves organising swimming pool first aid training for staff and volunteers, providing lesson plans and ideas for swimming coaching, ensuring that all the equipment needed for lessons is replaced each year, that the heating and recycling systems are functioning properly, as well as checking each day that the water has the right balance of water and chlorine to be safe for the children to use and finally decommissioning the pool at the end of the Summer term.



New Focus On The Wider World for William Barnes Children As the school celebrates twenty three years of successful 'good' OFSTED inspections following the publication of its latest report this Spring, Mrs Wrixon has exciting plans to widen the perspective of teachers and the children to more far reaching goals. During this past year and next, the staff are hoping to build upon the school's success at being awarded the 'Global Education' award by asking the children questions such as 'how can you make a difference in the world beyond the school gates?' and 'what skills and attitudes will help you to become a positive force for change in the world?' With our present curriculum already expanding the children's understanding of other cultures beyond simple stereotypes, through in depth studies of Australia, the Himalayan region of Ladakh, the Malala project, Born Free days, and our Discovery RE and Jigsaw PE schemes, the school already has a firm foundation on which to build. Read on to find out more about our recently awarded Eco School award, OFSTED's praise for our children's values and attitudes and plans to be involved an inspirational national initiative known simply as the 'We Project.'

William Barnes Achieves Eco Schools Award It seems remarkable to think that only 15 months ago, the first children at William Barnes began to enjoy Wednesday afternoons learning about the environment, biodiversity, nature based art and




survival skills such as fire making and shelter building in our very own bespoke and individually designed Forest School. Each half term throughout the year a different class has the opportunity to enjoy the fresh air whilst increasing their connection with the environment and the great outdoors. At lunchtimes, a group of particularly enthusiastic 'Eco-warriors' planned the school's route



towards our recent achievement of the Eco Schools award, with children across the school and during the extra curricular Forest School club putting the different strands of the plan into action. Led brilliantly by specialist teacher Miss Tabor, the school was proud to learn during the Summer term that we had

achieved 'Green Flag' Eco status and had received the Eco Schools award. To achieve this, the children had to gather evidence to prove the progress they

had made in improving the school environment, designing 5 and then building a bio-diverse forest 3 school area and saving energy throughout the various 0 school buildings.





Keep William Barnes Tidy The first of the three areas that the children focussed on was to analyse the litter that was spoiling the school's environment and what could be done about it. The Eco-warriors organised a litter pick and found that wrappers were the most widely found item in the school grounds. They also found there was more litter in the KS1 and reception playgrounds than in the KS2. To resolve this, the Eco-Warriors spoke about the importance of looking after and respecting he school environment during assembly time. However, all the children were impressed by how small the amount of litter was across the site, indicating that all the children were already aware of the need to use the pencil bins provided around the site rather than dropping wrappers on the floor.




Children Design and Develop Biodiverse Forest School Area The second stage of the development of the Forest school initiative involved making a plan for the layout of our forest school area. With the help of Eco-Warriors, a bird's eye view of how the children wanted to the Forest school to look when it had been completed was made. To encourage bio-diversity, a wild flower area was included to attract butterflies, homes for different kinds of insects were planned in the form of various 'bug hotels' and a hedgehog house was also built into the final design. Gradually over the next year or so, all of these areas have been put together by the children to create a really wonderful educational space that enriches the school grounds.



Energy Saving Across the School The final theme for the application for the Eco School's award was raise to awareness around the waste of Again, the Ecoenergy. warriors were heavily involved creating a series of posters that were put up around the school. The children were given a slot in assembly time



to talk about how to stop wasting energy. As a result, each class chose children to remember to turn off the lights and close the classroom doors to keep heat in on cold days.



OfSTED Praises the Children's Attitudes As the staff at William Barnes make plans to broaden the horizons of the children in further, OFSTED recently reserved high praise for the attitudes and values of the children interviewed as part of various 'deep dives' into the quality of education and health and well-being of the children at the school. Inspectors said that 'Leaders have designed a rich curriculum to prepare pupils to be 'global-ready' citizens. This curriculum provides pupils with opportunities to learn about the world beyond the school gates. It also reflects the school's locality. Pupils gain an awareness of different cultures through the wider curriculum. This is particularly strong in art and music. As a result, they are exceptionally well informed about diversity and difference. Pupils are accepting in their outlook and willing to challenge prejudice and discrimination.' London Art Gallery Trip One of the highlights of Year 6 at William Barnes Primary School is the London Gallery Art Trip. After a 5.45am arrival at school, we arrived at Trafalgar Square on time and spent a couple of hours in The National Gallery - Leonardo's Virgin of the Rocks and Stubbs' Whistlejacket were key favourites. Lunch on the South Bank was followed by a walk to the Tate Modern and Millenium Bridge. There were several landmarks for the children to find along the way - when they were spotted, the class were given £1 each time and had to vote on whether the £1 was: Given to a street artist

- -Donated to one of the Galleries
- -Spent on sweets for the class

After much discussion and several re-votes, the class finally voted for giving the money to the galleries / street artist! The class returned home tired but happy! (RF)



Oracy is Nothing New at William Barnes You may have heard in the news that there are plans in the pipeline to refocus on 'oracy' (or speaking and listening as it was known before 2010). In 2014, when the new curriculum was introduced into schools, the ability to speak to an audience, pronounce words clearly, debate ideas and listen carefully to different points of view, was implied but not specifically mentioned by the government, with the emphasis shifting to learning phonics, improving reading and developing writing. Recognising this missing link in children's learning and responding to the latest research, Mr Field led the staff through a year long 'Oracy project' which drew on key aspects of the pre-2014 programmes of study. Some of the children may remember the monthly 'Talk Tuesday' when the whole school day was devoted to activities that did not involve any writing at all. The school's recent focus on developing vocabulary through various activities including 'Vocabulary Ninja' and an approach to improving the children's expressive reading called 'Reading Theatre' all build on the foundations laid by the school's 'Oracy Project'.

Writing in Reception! This year, the children have worked so incredibly hard at their

writing skills. We've moved from writing our names at the start of the year, to labelling pictures, writing captions and now finishing the year with writing simple sentences. The children love to continue to practise their writing during our 'Let's Explore' time by using our inspiring writing area in the classroom. Mr Field and year 6 often encourage our writing by handing out certificates to celebrate our work. We are so proud of our independent writers and can't wait to see how their fabulous writing continues to develop in year 1. (NL)

Wellbeing Updates! This term, we have been fortunate to start up a 'Wellbeing club' on Monday lunchtimes. It has been wonderful to see how children have settled and relaxed into chatting, supporting and playing alongside children from different year groups in Key Stage 2. It is led by Mrs Chant and Mrs



Lewis and allows children to start their week off positively and in the right mind set for and progressing learning through the week. We provide a range of activities from board games to simple art and craft projects. Dorset Mind is a pioneering local charity supporting local people with mental health challenges. They educate, challenge mental health stigma and offer services across Dorset. We were lucky enough to have them visit and deliver a workshop for year 5 and 6 children focusing on how they can look after their own wellbeing. (NL)

Across school, we are introducing the approach to the children 'The Five Steps to Wellbeing'. Evidence suggests there are 5 steps you can take to improve your mental health and wellbeing. Trying these things could help you feel more positive and able to get the most out of life. The 5 steps are connect with other people, be physically active, learn new skills, give to others and be mindful and present. (NL)

Sports Day! Reception and Key Stage 1 sports day was a great success. The children participated with great



enthusiasm. They ran 4 races: the egg and spoon, the spinning race, the skipping race and the flat run race. It was lovely to see them cheering on their team mates and all taking part with such excitement and determination. The children were very fortunate to practise



for sports day with our PE lead, Mr Newman, which they thoroughly enjoyed doing. It was great to have so many supportive family members and friends attending, cheering on and encouraging the children. 
come unusable, so we have upgraded to a sand shed and as I write this article the sand is being deposited by children and staff in to the shed itself! Our topic this half

marks were decided upon. Having finished the school production just a few days before, year 6 have continued to use their time fruitfully right until the term's end. (RF)






